For the first time since 2019, ISEF finalists were able to compete in person. More than half of the finalists gathered in Atlanta, GA at the Georgia World Congress Center and the remaining finalists participated virtually. Due to their Grand Prize Awards at the Western Virginia Regional Science Fair, RVGS had 3 students qualify to attend ISEF. Rebecca Qiu (RVGS/WB), Caroline Grant (RVGS/HV) and Abhi Karri (RVGS/HV) were selected to advance and present their projects at ISEF. The students, along with Andrew Hurst and Melissa Fisher as chaperones, travelled to Atlanta from May 7-13 for a very busy week.



On Sunday, the students participate in one of the highlights of the fair, the pin exchange. Each group that attends ISEF brings a pin with them that represents their fair that sent them. Our pins had the Roanoke Star on them. The students were able to exchange pins with students around the world. Monday was spent setting up the projects and attending Opening Ceremonies.
